A message from Bryna Moritz Booth, Superintendent

I hope this note finds everyone well and enjoying the new year. I'm sure I am not the only one to feel a bit disheartened that we are still in a land of quarantines, social distancing and masking. We are pressing forward in the district with positive changes for students and continue to make gains academically despite the added challenges.

We are proud of the work we have accomplished thus far and are looking forward to what is on the horizon. During this time a few of the more exciting developments to note are; our staff has implemented a new reading program in grades K-6, implemented a new curriculum in Pre-kindergarten, opened a 3-year old Pre-kindergarten, started a Powersports Club, started Ski and Mural Club, created an afterschool Cub Club program, created ESports and Unified Sports opportunities for students, brought most of our special education programs in house, and created new and separate bus routes for elementary and junior/senior high school students.

In the near future we hope to officially welcome Little Love Bugs daycare into the district. We have had several hurdles in doing this, but Little Love Bugs is working through them. We know that this service is sorely needed for our community. We will continue to work toward this service being on-site. Our Storywalk will be opening for teachers and the community the first week of April. The book will be changed monthly at first and then possibly more frequently depending on how often it is utilized.

We continue to work on increasing student achievement, increasing student attendance, staff retention, and social emotional learning. In addition to the work done by our staff and administrative team, we have added a remote learning aide. The role of this individual will be to perform family outreach, provide work to students that are absent for multiple days, help incentivize good attendance, and really be a resource to those students who are chronically absent. This is the land we live in and we have to begin to address the problem in a different way.

Regarding our facilities and buildings, we have a lot of exciting movements with our current 2019 Capital Project. The business office and early learning entrance are complete. The academic intervention suite is being utilized, the locker rooms and pool are completely done. We are hoping to have the Junior/ Senior High School stairs, Technology and Ag rooms complete within the month. We are now entering phase 2 of the project. This will provide a kitchen in the junior/senior high school, so that our students are provided with higher quality options for breakfast and lunch. Currently all food is prepared in our elementary school and put into warming carts in the morning. These are then transported to the Junior/ Senior High School and food is served to students. The number one complaint we have received from students is the quality of food. Our cafeteria staff is excited to be able to address these concerns once the kitchen is complete.

more information on this project as it becomes available.

On the horizon, in order to keep our debt and aid level we will be approaching stakeholders to be part of planning groups for a new capital project. This planning work will begin this spring and summer. It is our hope that we would bring this to a vote in the 2022/2023 school year. We are only in initial







Board of Education Nominating Petition

To the District Clerk of the Pine Valley Central School District:

We, the undersigned, do hereby state that we are duly qualified voters of the Pine Valley Central School District, and we hereby nominate the following named person as a candidate member of the Board of Education of said district. (This will be a three-year term.)

This petition needs to be returned to the District Clerk at the Superintendent's Office thirty (30) days prior to the annual meeting. This year that date is Monday, April 18, 2022 (by 5 pm). Nominating petitions in the Pine Valley Central School District must be signed by at least twenty-five (25) qualified district voters. A qualified voter is a citizen of the United States, is at least 18 years old, and has been a district resident for at least 30 days immediately prior to the vote held on 5/17/2022.

A Message From The Transportation Department

FOR STUDENTS AND FAMILIES IN WINTER WEATHER

- 1. BE OUT 5 MINUTES PRIOR TO PICK UP TIME: Students should be out for their stop at least 5 minutes prior to their scheduled pick-up time. If a sub driver is managing the route, students should be visible to the driver. Loading safely and guickly helps to keep buses on schedule.
- 2. STAND BACK AT LEAST 15 FEET FROM THE BUS STOP: If the bus slides, students should be out of the danger zone. Train students to watch for the bus to slide, and to know what the danger signal means. (USING THE HORN MEANS-GO BACK TO WHERE YOU CAME FROM.)
- 3. DRESS FOR THE WEATHER: If the bus gets stuck or there is a breakdown, the temperature inside the bus will drop quickly. Winter coat, hat, and gloves should be worn and/or kept in students' backpacks. Boots should be worn for warmth and traction on snow and
- 4. AVOID SNOWBANKS: At the bus stop, students should avoid climbing over, standing on and walking through snowbanks. Although it sounds like fun, if a student falls or slides off the bank, there is the potential for them to slide under the bus.



ELEMENTARY SCHOOL COUNSELING OFFICE NEWS

Mr. Shane Gallivan & Miss Kate Caldwell, School Counselors

The high school counseling department has expanded into the elementary school. Shane Gallivan is the counselor for the 5th grade students and our new counselor, Kate Caldwell, will work with the 6th grade students. Part of the counselors' roles for these students is to assist them in developing life skills, prepare them for the transition to middle/high school, and begin the exploration process of college and careers.

When considering the development of life skills, topics such as stress management, time management, goal setting, interpersonal effectiveness, and self-awareness are important skills to teach. These skills are discussed in a group setting where students can engage in prompted scenarios that allow for them to create a dialog between themselves. This allows for the students to further explore why the skills are important, how to develop them, and how to implement them appropriately. The counselors challenge the students to think beyond stigmas and stereotypes to promote a diverse range of opportunities that they can explore.

Similarly, during the discussions of the life skill development, the counselors emphasize the relatability and importance of having these skills when transitioning to middle school, and then high school. Discussing this transition is done in an open format where students can ask questions, share experiences, and be informed of the various processes to help them feel more prepared. Skill lessons are focused to give students more opportunities to test their abilities and apply the skills to a variety of settings.

Furthermore, although the students have many years before college and career opportunities may come up, we understand that no one student's experience will be the exact same. That is why we encourage students to explore sooner rather than later. This allows for them to begin evaluating their interests, researching colleges and careers based on their interests, and receiving information on what opportunities they would have access to, through BOCES Career & Technical Education programs, alternative education pathways (I.e., PTECH), and collaborative college experiences that are offered through Pine Valley. This will further enhance their knowledge and experience of the careers they could someday be professionals in.

Our goal is to reach each student and help them discover opportunities they may have never known they could have, help them determine the steps to getting to their goals, and how to effectively execute the opportunity they behold. We take pride in being advocates for the students while they are learning to be advocates for themselves.

College Exploration

We are strongly encouraging juniors and their families to start (or continue) the college exploration process. Many colleges are currently or will soon hold Open House events. It is as easy as a google search! Just search for the college you would like to see, and then choose their Admissions page. It is a great idea for Sophomores and Juniors to start these college searches as soon as possible.

We need to let our students and families know that you can no longer wait until senior year to start college and career planning. The college application and FAFSA application timelines have been moved up in the last few years, so we want to help you out with our tips!

Career and Technical Education Program Exploration

In January, Sophomore students were given an opportunity to visit the Career and Technical Education Programs at the LoGuidice Educational Center in Fredonia. Students were able to learn more about how classes are organized, how credits at BOCES are earned, what college articulation agreements are available and what kinds of work-based learning they could be involved in.

The next step is for students to meet with their counselor to discuss their high school graduation plan and the courses they wish to take next year. If a CTE program is within their goals, we will send home a letter and an agreement form for both parents and students to review together. When this form is returned, we will start the registration process. If you have questions about this program, please call our office.

Scheduling Process for 2022-2023

The counseling department worked with the high school principal and our teachers to create the 2022-2023 curriculum guide which includes core class offerings, elective classes and other course policies. Students should align their future college and career goals with their course selections and graduation pathways.

Scheduling for the 2022-2023 year will begin with students using the curriculum guide to guide their course selections which they will enter into PowerSchool. After that, students will be scheduled to meet with Mr. Gallivan and Miss Caldwell. During this meeting, students will review scheduling options and discuss opportunities they have based on their grade level, academic progress, and graduation pathways. During the scheduling process, Regents, BOCES, advanced/traditional pathways, college course opportunities, and alternative placements such as PTECH are all discussed, based on what grade the student is in. Our curriculum guide and scheduling information is also available on the Counseling Department's page of the PVCS website.

Again, between January and March, students will meet one-on-one with their counselor to choose and discuss their classes for next year as well as their plans beyond high school. Parents are welcome and strongly encouraged to attend these meetings in order to take part in the process. To schedule your appointment, please call the counseling office secretary- Mrs. Stacy Chase at extension 4334.
